Nate Lerner (b.1982, Cambridge, MA) studied photography at Wesleyan University (MALS, 2017) and is based in New Haven, CT. His work concerns the wonder and trauma of being in the world and the formal relationships that emerge when examining that experience with cameras.

Trained as a composer in the conservatory tradition of western art music, he is particularly interested the ways in which form, sequence, and the liminal realms between images create space for simultaneities of meaning-making. Review.

ARTIST STATEMENT

My work is about looking at things with cameras. As such, my primary materials are light, time, the picture plane, and the frame. Everything is terrible and wonderful and our brief being-towards-death is made richer by taking time to look at things as part of a concerted praxis of delight. I emphasize a balance between compositional rigor and aesthetic beauty, the indexical and the dreamlike. While the content of my images is clear and direct, their subject generally remains oblique and resists easy explanation - the work refuses to shout, and occupies a space beyond words as only visual art, dance, or certain musics can. Sequencing these images in photobook form exploits liminal realms between images and creates space for viewers to generate subjective interpretations with every reading; this requisite, participatory dynamic allows for possibilities of limitless cycles whereby the work is re-completed with each viewing.
